The references to biodiversity are welcome, but don't reflect several of the relevant local authorities specifically mentioning bird nesting boxes and bat boxes in their new Local Plans, nor the draft London Plan which also mentions artificial nest sites, as well as being referenced in national policy, as follows:

Hackney - Hackney Plan 2033 (Section LP47 Biodiversity, clause D) states: "All development schemes with an eaves height or roof commencement height of 5m and above are required to provide nesting boxes for swifts, sparrows, starlings, and/ or bats as appropriate to help preserve endangered urban biodiversity in Hackney"

Islington - the draft Islington Plan 2020-2035 (G4 section 5.27 page 153) states: "Buildings can provide roosting sites for bats and nesting opportunities for birds... Artificial nest boxes/bricks should be incorporated within developments (refurbishments, extensions and/or new build) to provide nesting and roosting opportunities for birds, including species under threat such as swifts, house martins, swallows and house sparrows, and where appropriate, bats."

Waltham Forest "SHAPING THE BOROUGH Waltham Forest Local Plan" (LP1) 2020 – 2035, Proposed Submission Document (Regulation 19) October 2020 (Policy 81) states: "D: Where

opportunities arise, development proposals should seek to provide measures to support species and habitats through the use of landscaping on or adjacent to buildings. This may involve the inclusion of living roofs and walls or other measures which provide space for species to nest, roost or hibernate."
